














Welcome from the Headmaster

'As you said you had never heard of Salisbury Cathedral', the sender wrote, 'I thought it was about time you had'.



We had found ourselves rummaging through old postcards in a huge warehouse of vintage items. There is something deeply compelling in reading these messages penned long ago: some bland, some cryptic, many borderline illegible. They refer to people, places and events long forgotten, saying nothing or hinting everything.

The postcard of Salisbury Cathedral featured no name or address, just that short, amusingly passive-aggressive note. Sellotape marks on the back showed it had been kept and displayed

and treasured. For 25p, we saved that postcard from oblivion in a dusty cardboard box, and it is valued once again. We cannot tell who wrote the card or where it came from, but that memory and moment shines through.

Old Lidunians defend their crown for the 3rd year

The pressure was on for the KES old boys as they took to a pitch filled with the raucous sound of the "Peaky Blinder" from Arnold fans at the Old Boys' Boxing Day Rugby Fixture, 2022.

We caught up with the Touch Judge for the match, Mr Rudd, and ex KES and AKS teacher and passionate supporter of the boys in blue.

On a cold winter afternoon, with the flood lights on, the boys in blue took to a pitch filled with the raucous sound of the "Peaky Blinder" from Arnold fans. After two consecutive victories the pressure was on for the KES old boys to make their hat-trick of wins and the Old Arnoldians showed up in full to take back their crown.

The Old Arnoldians started as the stronger side with some excellent play and a constant bombardment of the Old Lid's line. It was during one of these early phases that KES lost their inspirational captain to concussion after a massive try-saving tackle.

After conceding a 3-point penalty success, the KES side opened the Lid's account with a fine individual try from scrum-half Adam Lannigan, which saw a lightning turn of pace over 50m taking him clear of the Arnold defenders and scoring. Capitalising on their momentum the boys in blue powered over for a fine team try and pounced on an Arnold error to fly hack the ball up the pitch, allowing for the 3rd try from the KES side.

Unfortunately, due to some poor discipline from the Old Lid's pack, we saw a sin binning and several penalties being conceded. The Old Arnoldians were able to take advantage of this and score 2 tries, drawing the match to a first half finish of 19 - 17, to the Old Lidunians.

The second half was a scrappier affair with the conditions starting to


The final score of the game was from a steal at the lineout where Alex Stanier gathered a bouncing ball and, to the delight of every true blue in the ground, out-paced the defence to seal the victory in the right-hand corner.

The final score 24 - 17.



A wonderful afternoon at a packed Woodlands was finished off with a fine "Boat Race", Team Player of the Day award (Old Lids Adam Lannigan) and a lot of catching up with the old boys and girls from both schools. It was lovely to see the clubhouse buzzing with chatter about memories of times at Queen Mary, Arnold and King Edwards. It was mentioned that very few if any schools in the country could host such an event. With the Old Lidunians winning for a third consecutive year, the Arnold cliental already had their books out signing on this year's Year 13 players.

On a personal note, it was great to catch up with not only a lot of my ex 1st and 2nd teamers but also my old year 8 maths sets in particular.

Meeting Old Arnoldian, Sam Wood, aged 99

It was my pleasure to meet Sam Wood at his son David's home in Lytham in January. Sam attended Arnold School during the 1930s.

It was a morning of memories as I shared with Sam the Arnold whole school photographs from 1935 and 1940 which have been preserved in the AKS archives. On these photographs, Sam recognised many former classmates such as brothers Dennis and Alan Grime, Biggie Brierley and Norman Quick. He also recognised many teachers, most notably Frank Truswell Pennington who founded Arnold House School in the late 1800s. Mr Pennington features on the photographs as Headmaster, a role which he had undertaken since the school had originally been registered as Arnold House School Limited in 1913. Sam remembers Mr Pennington as a firm but fair headmaster and this is very much in keeping with the description of him in Sir Martin Holdgate's 2009 book about Arnold School.

There were 4 Houses during Sam's time at Arnold (the Normans, the Danes, the Celts and the Saxons) and Sam was in Saxon House. He also played rugby and enjoyed other sports at the school such as shooting.

Sam also features in the Arnold School Book written by Sir Martin Holdgate. Here is Sam during a Cadet Corps Inspection as Captain George Holt escorts the Inspecting Officer, with Lt Norman Lees and Sgt Major George Neal behind him.




Arnold School was founded on the values of commitment, service and loyalty. During Sam's time at Arnold, these values were certainly forefront when Sam, alongside many other pupils at that time, joined the army to serve his country during World War II. Sam left Arnold when he was 17 years old in 1940 to serve with HM Forces in the 5th Manchester Regiment as an Army Tank Operator. During his service with the 5th Manchester Regiment, Sam also taught many fellow soldiers to drive which was a skill very few young men had learnt before they joined the army. Sam's duty is a reminder of the courageous service many former pupils of our heritage schools gave for their country during World War II.

When Sam returned from the War, he settled back in the Fylde area and later in life his hobbies included rally driving and flying.

It was wonderful to spend time sharing memories with Sam, our oldest Old Arnoldian, and I am very grateful to Sam and his family for the opportunity.

We caught up with Old Lidunian, lain Hutton, who graduated from King Edward School in 1979 as he shared his recent 2022 reunion experience.

Another great success.

The 2022 Reunion was a follow up to the 1999 (20-year reunion) King Edward boys only and the joint one with our QMS friends in 2009 (both at the Clifton Arms Hotel in St Annes).

The 2022 reunion came to fruition when Ian King and Clive Marquis-Carr were travelling on a bus in Edinburgh, whilst on holiday with their wives — what began as an idea led to a Facebook page being hastily set up and plans were made for the event.

Gone was the long hair, platform shoes and flared trousers – sensibility had taken its place, but when the group met for the tour of the school in the morning the years simply melted away – "it was as if we had been returning to school after a summer break, not 13 years since the last one, and certainly not 43 years since we left" commented the group.

The whole event was a great success – the tour was inspirational, led by Sarah Shepherd at AKS, who took time to take us to every corner of the old school, including some that were still 'out of bounds' even in the 1970s. Sarah listened intently to many anecdotes of our



bygone era. Memories flooded back of the teachers, some with particular 'unique' teaching styles! when certain classrooms were re-entered for the first time in 43 years.

The Pavilion café was an excellent end to a wonderful morning of memories and re kindling 'old friendships', some that had endured since local junior schools.

A night out in Lytham was an opportunity to reminisce even further, possibly helped along by the odd drink or two and we were joined by some others who could not make the daytime tour which only added to the evening.

Plans are already in discussion for a future reunion, maybe in 3 or 5 years' time – Pete Meredith commented "maybe we could entice some of our international classmates, who were unable to attend this one". We all agreed, before saying our farewells, that we would do this again.

A Woman in a Man's World

Liz Bickerstaffe shares the story of Queen Mary alumna, Jennifer Coulston-Herrmann, on her inspiring career in the police force.

A former head girl recently returned in September to entertain the QMS Association on her career as 'A Woman in a Man's World'.

Jennifer Coulston-Herrmann (née Taylor) is now a public speaker and raconteur, following a successful career in the police force. By her own admission she may not always have been the model pupil, but she was lively and dutiful and a popular choice for head girl at QMS from 1987-88.

When she expressed an interest in joining the police, the careers advisor discouraged her by saying that 'girls from this school don't join the police'. Determined to follow her own path, she studied for a BA (Hons) in Applied Social Science (Criminology and Psychology) at Edge Hill College and joined Lancashire Constabulary in 1991.

Jen worked across Lancashire in a variety of predominantly uniformed policing roles moving very swiftly up the ranks. By the year 2000, Jen was the youngest female Inspector in Lancashire Police. She was a founder member of the Women's Network for Lancashire Police and also became the Deputy Equality Liaison Officer for the Force. In 2001, Jen became a National Hostage Negotiator and undertook her training with the Metropolitan Police. She later became a Kidnap Negotiator and part of the National Cadre, attending serious and protracted incidents throughout England and Wales.

Despite the very serious nature of her work Jen's talk was often hilarious and demonstrated how a sense of humour could be essential in defusing very tense situations. The discipline and resilience she developed at home and at school had stood her in good stead for her career enabling her to progress quickly in a predominantly man's world, whilst managing to juggle being a parent to twins! And the S46 Preston bus journey provided her with the best riot training ever, she joked. "Much better than any training the Home Office offered the Police!"

During her service, Jen completed a Master's degree in Training and Evaluation, achieving an MEd from Hull University in 2004. As a Police Federation representative, she represented staff with grievances or complaints and was frequently invited to speak at events on the national stage.

Following retirement, Jen facilitated training and conference events, along with public and after dinner speaking and speech writing. As well as hosting a Ukrainian family, she has recently passed the selection process to become a magistrate, saying 'I always like to be kept busy!'

On behalf of the QMS Association, Liz Bickerstaffe thanked AKS for hosting the event in the Sixth Form Centre and the school's catering team for providing a delicious afternoon tea.


AKS Foundation Launch Event
